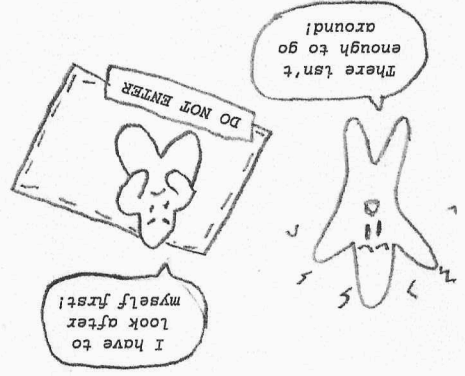


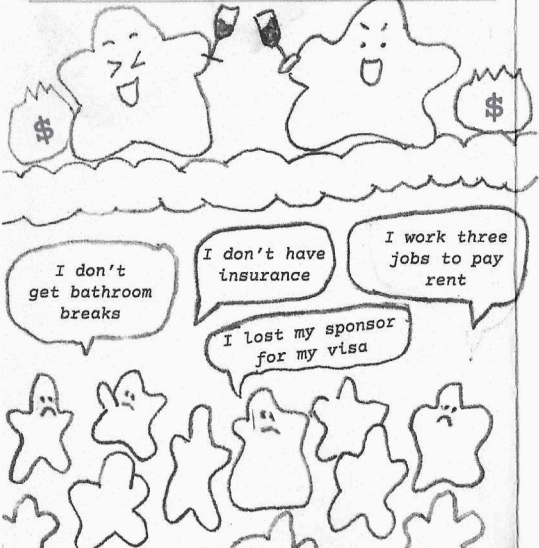
In a society where these ideas are ingrained in us, it becomes acceptable to act in ways that harm others, the environment, or the collective good.



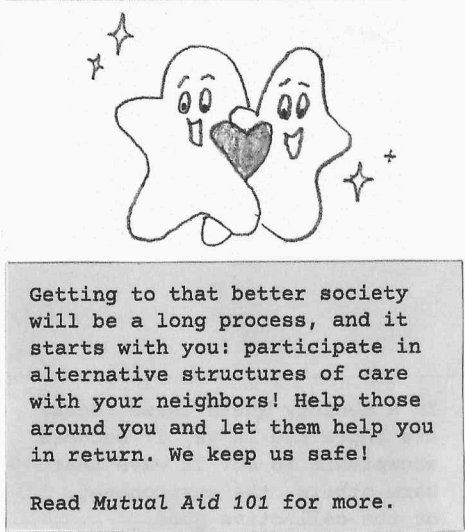
Capitalism relies on and promotes the ideas of **scarcity** and **individualism**, which put people in a state of always needing more for themselves in order to feel secure.

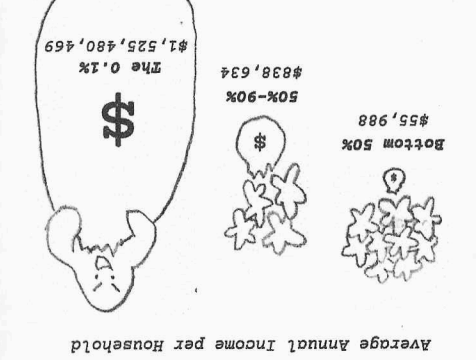

But Capitalism is not inevitable, and you are not alone! We can have - and deserve - a **society where all people's needs are met** and the well-being of the collective is more central to our values.

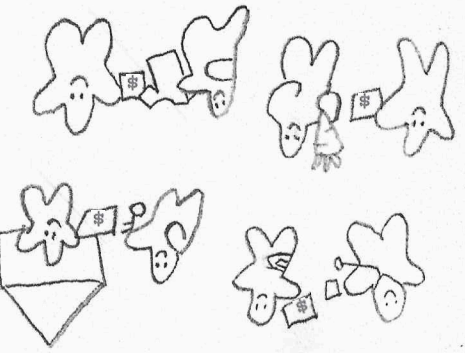


Why has it ended up this way? Is this what the "best interests of society" looks like?

But Capitalism in practice has ended up **centering wealth and power on a tiny few**, leaving the rest of us with just enough (or not even enough) to survive.

Adam Smith, the "Godfather of Capitalism" believed that such a system would serve the best interests of society.



Capitalism, in theory, is an economic system in which the ownership and production of goods, property, and labor is **privatized** and supply and demand determine fair prices in a market.
